











### **NIMBY Terminology**

- **Rarely** defined same way by different researchers
- Often: catchall term to label opposition
- **Sometimes**: implies citizens have illegitimate or irrational selfish reasons for opposing facilities

### 2. Inclusion


- Substantially engage variety of community voices
- Tolerate diverse views
- Include views of those often neglected or hard-to-reach

### 3. Deliberation

#### Public will:

- Consume & process information about proposed development & impacts
- Engage with issues considered in proposal
- Provide reasoned arguments for preferences about development
